Re: Recommended Options for Hawks Trail Road Improvements and Building Permit Allowances

Council Members:

**INTRODUCTION >>>** This matter was presented to the City Council at its last meeting on March 28, 2016, where the background regarding this private roadway was explained to the members and the lengthy lists of issues and efforts to address its conditions over the last twenty (20) years. Prompting the review of this private roadway was the desire of one (1) of the first purchasers of the lots to now sell the property and wanting an assurance that, if a buyer does purchase it, building permits could be issued for the construction of a dwelling. Currently, the City has been hesitant to release authorizations for building permits on this roadway, given the condition of it, the lack of progress by past developers of these lots, and the unsatisfactory experiences the City has had in similar circumstances and how these situations ended with Wildwood being portrayed as not doing enough, regardless of its effort or outcome.

**BACKGROUND >>>** It is important to note regarding this private roadway that, to date, the grading and paving of it have occurred, but to a substandard pavement thickness of approximately two (2) inches, leaving the roadway very susceptible to damage from heavy traffic, i.e. construction vehicles. Already, portions of the roadway have had to be repaired by a past homebuilder, Windwood Development, who was the entity that constructed the roadway to the aforementioned, substandard thickness, in conjunction with an authorization to construct a single-family residence on one (1) of the lots (the only remaining partner of Windwood Development, Hugh Plunkett, continues to own one of the other vacant lots). The repair that occurred was completed to the required base asphalt thickness of six (6) inches, in preparation of a future two (2) inch asphalt overlay. However, other segments of the roadway remain at a substandard thickness, and have continued to deteriorate with time. Both the original developer and subsequent homebuilder have not been responsive, despite often committing to address this matter. Given this situation, the City issued summonses, held building permits, discussed litigation and was threatened of the same, and met countless times, but little progress was made in terms of the roadway improvements. These discussions have been on going and are still underway at this time.

**OPTIONS >>>** Given the desire of the current owner to sell the lot, the Departments of Planning and Public Works provided a list of options that were also reviewed by the City Attorney and the City Administrator. These options included six (6) approaches to this request from the lot owner and included the following items:

1. The City undertakes the improvement of the roadway and places liens on the properties that would not participate in this improvement program. However, this action would require the City to first

declare the road a nuisance, seek a court order directing one (1) or more of the owners to abate the nuisance and, if that does not occur, the City could abate the nuisance and place liens on the Lots. These liens would fall behind any existing liens or mortgages already filed and in place.

2. The City continues to hold building permits, until the lot owners themselves address the matter.
3. The City pursues some level of litigation against the successor developer of this subdivision and attempts to have the roadway improved through a court action.
4. The City issues the building permit and accepts the current condition of the roadway as-is.
5. The City issues the requested building permit, but collects a pro-rated share from each applicant for building permit for the roadway improvement costs to be used in its reconstruction in the future.
6. The City issues the requested building permit, but collects a cash escrow for the purpose of addressing any damage to the current roadway from construction traffic.

**OUTCOME >>>** After discussion of these options, and with a recommendation of the Department of Planning, the City Council concurred that zoning authorizations for building permits could be issued for any vacant lot currently served by Hawks Trail Road, if only the following conditions were met by the property owner or owner under contract seeking the authorization/permit:

1. Submit to the City a cash escrow in the amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00), which it will hold to eventually provide to the Homeowners Association, or other designated entity, to complete improvements to Hawks Trail Road to the City's minimum standard for private roadways in rural areas of Wildwood, or as determined appropriate by the Director of Public Works.
2. Provide a refundable escrow in the amount of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for any repairs or replacements of the private roadway from damages that are attributable to any construction activity associated with the development of the remaining vacant lots. The Department of Public Works and the property owner/owner under contract, for where the zoning authorization has been issued, shall conduct a visual inspection of the private roadway, before construction is initiated, so as to identify any existing deficiencies relative to it.

With these conditions in place, the City can at least begin the process of addressing this substandard roadway, without using taxpayers' funds, and eventually create a pool of funds for improvements, so as, at some point in the future, have it accepted for maintenance by the overall Homeowners Association of Hawks Rest Subdivision. These outcomes would represent a major improvement to the conditions that exist on this private roadway today.

Re: Consultant Agreement with Environmental Stewardship Concepts (Dr. Peter DeFur)

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### Background

On January 22, 2016, the City Administrator authorized an initial \$5,000 agreement with Environmental Stewardship Concepts (ESC) for conducting a document review and preparing a report relative to the current status of the Ellisville Superfund Site, which includes a portion of the proposed Strecker Forest development site and the Callahan property sub-site. Additionally, arrangements were made for a visit by Dr. Peter DeFur of ESC to present the report and answer questions of the City Council. To date, between the research, report preparation and travel/presentation, costs have now reached a total of \$7,885.28. Therefore, it will be necessary to increase the maximum sum of the agreement to cover these costs and future costs as needed.

### Recommendation

It is recommended that the City extend its agreement with Environmental Stewardship Concepts to a new cap of \$20,000.00.

### Reasons for Recommendation

1. ESC's expertise will continue to prove very valuable in addressing this very important public health issue.
2. Funds totaling \$30,000 have been budgeted in 2016 for consultant expenses related to this issue.
3. The budget balance of \$10,000 could be needed for other related expenses, such as obtaining monitoring well data or other analyses.

Resolution #2016-09 has been placed on the April 11, 2016 City Council Agenda for action.

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**Other Related Matters**

It is anticipated that an update and discussion of next steps relative to the ongoing public health concerns on the Ellisville Superfund Site will be scheduled for the April 25, 2016 City Council Work Session. Additionally, the City's recent written objection to the delisting of the Callahan Subsite has been reposted to the EPA's site for public comment. Additional technical information is also being compiled to include as well.

I will be available for any questions or comments at the April 11, 2016 City Council Work Session.

Re: 2016 Farmers Market Managers' Agreement/Contract

### Council Members:

The 2015 Farmers Market Season can only be considered a success, given the direction it has taken under the current managers, the number of participating vendors at the end of the year, and the positive feedback the City received regarding this venue from participants and customers. The managers, George and Rene' Sackett, have been overseeing the market since 2013 and worked diligently to address the identified shortcomings of its previous efforts and operate it in a manner that was profitable for them and the vendors, while still offering residents a positive experience in terms of local, homegrown, and/or homemade goods, foods, and produce. The market was so well received that, in 2013, 2014, and 2015, it included two (2) indoor opportunities in November and December, which were well received by the participating community.

The managers have been spending the off-season making preparations for the upcoming year and ensuring both the Wildwood and Maplewood Farmers Markets are successful in 2016. Since the end of 2015, the managers have advised the City they will no longer be involved in the Ellisville Market, but have added responsibilities for the Maplewood Farmers Market, which is held at Schlafly's Bottleworks. Additionally, the managers have been attending different conferences and workshops over the winter to prepare for the upcoming season. Similarly, the City staff has also been reviewing its equipment needs, and related items, so as it is ready for the opening of the Farmers Market in late May.

One (1) of the items the Department of Planning and Parks must address, in preparation for the upcoming season, is the development of the required agreement with the market managers for this year. The Department had several conversations with the Sacketts on this matter and received an e-mail from them with the recommended revisions to the agreement. To summarize, the main points of the agreement, the Department would note the following:

- a.) Amount of compensation for the managers' services would remain unchanged from 2015 to 2016, at seventeen thousand five hundred dollars (\$17,500.00) per year, with a two hundred fifty dollar (\$250.00) increase to the stipend the managers received from the City for

advertising, attending conferences and workshops, and membership fees and dues (now a total of \$1,750.00).

- b.) Vendor fees will remain identical to last year – twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per week for a regular participant.
- c.) Memberships of the managers are retained in the Missouri Farmers Market Association and AgriMissouri.

The Department believes the agreement to be satisfactory and recommends it be considered by City Council for acceptance and passage and include in it all of the components that are noted above.

With the success of last year's Farmers Market, City officials remain confident about the upcoming 2016 Season and that it will even be better than 2015 and bring it closer to the desires of the City Council, when it began offering it to residents in 2009. Additionally, the Department has been very pleased with the managers and believes they will continue to promote the market in a very positive manner, while ensuring the concept of purchasing and consuming locally grown products, foods, and produce is good for the individual, the community, and the environment. The Farmers Market has been a challenge over many of its years, but remains an excellent expression of Wildwood's goal of providing its residents a community that is a great place to live, work, and play.

Re: Update on the City's Rural Internet Access Project

Council Members:

The Department of Planning has not received an update from Wisper ISP regarding its potential fiber optic installation in the areas of Wild Horse Creek Road and State Route 109. The impact of such an installation cannot be understated in an area that is so poorly served with options for high-speed internet service. The last correspondence from Wisper ISP noted that something would be provided to the City by the week of March 28, 2016. As noted, the Department has nothing to report at this time relative to this item.

However, since the last update on this matter, a trustee in the Wild Horse Farms Subdivision sent an email to Council Member McGowen (Ward One) about the lack of progress in finding a high-speed internet solution for this area of Wildwood, the poor choice of wireless internet access by the City, as a solution to this problem, and the area's frustration with the City for not being willing to compensate Charter Communications for work to bring internet service to these locations by the City of Wildwood. The e-mail in this regard is attached.

The Department still believes its past position on this matter, which was verified/directed by the City Attorney, to be accurate, i.e. the City cannot use public money for private purposes, without some benefit to the entire community, but would be willing to contact Charter Communications and seek more information on the cost of this service and timelines for such. This contact would be introductory, but would be intended to find service options acceptable to all parties. Again, in past discussions with Charter Communications, the company has not wanted to provide any ownership of the improvements (fiber optic, conduit, etc.) or a fee or recoupment component to offset the taxpayers' outlay in this regard. These circumstances led to the action of the City Council not pursuing an agreement with the cable provider.

As part of this update, the Department is also presenting information regarding current payments to the City from the two (2) providers that utilize its current system of sixteen (16) poles. The last payments from these two (2) companies totalled \$1,245.00 (January 1, 2016 – March 16, 2016), which is indicative of approximately four hundred (400) households being served by these two (2) networks that are provided by Bays ET and Wisper ISP. Most recently, Bays ET has been adding customers to its system, particularly with the installations of the latest three (3) poles. Without the City's efforts, many of these households would not have service at this time.

Lastly, the Department received the attached e-mail from a resident, who has been waiting patiently for service from Wisper ISP that would originate from the emergency communication tower in Babler State Park. As detailed in this e-mail response from Richard Barney, the Executive Director of the Emergency Communications

Commission (ECC), to this individual, a moratorium has been in place since November 2015 on the use of these towers, so as an audit can be completed by the Department of Homeland Security on the practicality of their use for commercial applications. First, the Department would note that no one from St. Louis County advised the City of this situation, after many contacts over the last year about the status of the towers for use by Bays ET and Wisper ISP and, secondly, the representative from the Emergency Communications Commission (ECC) had noted, when the towers were under review by the City several years ago, that no other commercial applications were planned for these towers, given their purpose and security associated with them. In both instances, the Department believes St. Louis County is not maintaining its commitments to the City of Wildwood.

Greg:

A few years ago we felt we were close to working out arrangements with Charter to get them to extend high speed internet service (which would probably have also included TV and voice phone service) to unserved areas of the city. As negotiations proceeded however, Charter told us that to do so they would require an upfront payment of approximately \$3 million dollars due to the economic considerations of the low density of potential users and the difficulty of extending fiber over an extensive area. Charter was also unable or unwilling to allow the city to bill a surcharge or special user fee to the Charter customers who used the service. Since the city was not set up to handle billing of the hundreds of customers who would use the Charter service, without the assistance of Charter the hoped for deal fell apart. We revisited the billing accomodation issue with Charter in more recent years only to find they remained unwilling to assist in the billing process.

The city could and I believe already does impose a franchise fee on Charter. The company bears the full cost of extending and providing service to their customers. In this case the City is not paying for the installation of any service or equipment.

As we discuss internet service its important to understand there are differences between what municipalities can charge providers of such service. The Federal law which since 1998 by multiple extensions has barred the taxation of internet access was recently made permanent when President Obama signed into effect a new law on 2/24/16, refer to 47 U.S.C.A. 152. Thus no taxes or franchise fees are allowed to be charged to providers of internet service. My own AT&T Uverse combined bill shows that my internet service includes no fees or taxes of any sort. When our past efforts to work out arrangements with Charter collapsed, we focused our attention on smaller wireless providers that agreed to work with us to extend and provide internet only service. As the two providers do so, as internet providers they are exempt from any franchise fees. However, they do pay the city a user fee, i.e. rent for being allowed to place their equipment on special poles the city has paid to have installed with electric service brought to the poles. We will continue working with Wisper ISP and Bays ET in our efforts to have internet service extended to all parts of the city.

It is interesting that providers of cable TV service can be charged franchise fees whereas providers of satellite TV service cannot be charged such fees. The rationale for that difference is that, unlike cable companies, satellite providers do not use public rights-of-way, and therefore the satellite providers do not pay franchise fees. Again my own AT&T combined bill shows that my current Directv service which is a satellite provider includes no taxes or fees of any sort. Prior to the time I switched to Directv service, my AT&T bill for uverse TV cable service included a local video franchise fee.

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Tim and Greg:

I want to respond to Tim's comments and concerns in the following email. Over the last couple days I've reconfirmed my understanding of the city's position concerning our efforts to assist in the extension of high speed internet service to residents in areas that now lack or have inadequate service.

Our position is that there is a material difference between a developer paying to bring utilities (water, electric, sanitary sewer, cable, internet, etc.) to a private development versus a public entity doing the same. Our legal counsel has advised us that the Missouri Constitution in Article VI Sections 23 and 25 prohibit a City from granting public money to any private individual, association, or corporation. Given the case law interpreting these provisions, the city has taken the approach that expenditure of public funds in connection with the rural internet extension program should include a mechanism to recoup the public funds expended as well as retaining ownership of the facilities. The reason for retaining ownership of some part of the infrastructure involved in extending the internet service, is that by doing so, it provides the City a means to recoup the funds we have expended. **The City has the ability to tax. As the million other items on phone/cable bills, the City could attach say a 5% royalty and recoup its money from the users.** By illustration, the city has paid to install approximately a dozen utility poles scattered throughout underserved areas, and internet providers such as Winnet ISP and Bays ET pay a fee to the city for being able to install their wireless

providers such as wisper ISF and Days E1 pay a fee to the city for being able to install their wireless equipment on those poles. thus over time, the fees the providers pay to Wildwood allow us to recoup the public funds expended. Again the City could pay for the fiber and can charge use tax of sorts on those that tap in by charging a % of the service cost. It just looks like the City does not want to look at a different way to "skin the cat".

Keep in mind that only residents in the less dense areas receive the benefit of the extension of internet service to their private residences, since those in the more dense areas already have it. If public funds intended to benefit all residents are used to assist with the extension of service to benefit only a few, you can probably understand why many residents may feel that represents inequitable treatment. I am guessing that the City already spends some money on walking paths/bridges that certainly are not meant to benefit me in any real practical sense of the word benefit. Thus the need for a recoupment mechanism. Again charge a reasonable user fee.

In our part of Wildwood, residents over a year ago objected to placement of a utility pole on the north side of Wild Horse Creek Road (WHC) due to the requirement it be painted white and orange and be lighted due to FAA requirements. To date Wisper has not been able to work out arrangements to install their equipment on the STL County emergency network tower in Babler Park. Due to these limitations, we have tried to identify another recoupment mechanism. One that seems to make sense currently is the idea of the city participating by installing conduit along WHC road. We are hoping to have firm cost numbers from Wisper to consider very shortly. The city would then charge a fee to Wisper, Charter or any other provider wanting to place their cable runs in the city owned conduit. The city has no interest in owning any of the technological equipment such as the actual fiber cable runs, switches, etc. since we are not in the business of providing technology services. Whisper does not appear to be doing anything reasonable when it comes to investment in Wildwood. Wasn't Whisper supposed to have these same numbers at the last Council Meeting? The whole Whisper participation seems sad.

Every time we have explored with Charter whether some form of recoupment mechanism can be identified, we have been unable to work out arrangements satisfactory to both parties. Again don't recoup from Charter, recoup from the user (minus Charter Vig), It is important to reiterate that legal counsel has advised us as recently as yesterday that we would be in violation of state law if we were to pay Charter or any private entity to install fiber optic cable along WHC road without a recoupment mechanism in place, since doing so would involve expending public funds to benefit only some of the residents without such benefit being offered to everyone in the City.

The city is not tied to Wisper as the only possible provider. If we could work out a recoupment plan with Charter or others (see above) to address the legal requirements we face, I'm sure the city would be willing to discuss seriously such possibilities. However, we cannot violate the law to accommodate Charter or other private entities. If your group can help us identify another way in which we could assist in this endeavor, which includes a recoupment mechanism, I will be glad to bring it forward for consideration.

Greg has been keeping me in the loop regarding the cities willingness to participate in the Charter and Wildhorse Spring

Farm agreement to bring fiber into the neighborhood to include Cable TV, Broadband Internet (100mbps) and IP landline phone service. The contract price we have with them for bringing their services down Wild Horse Creek Rd. is (\$37,142.54) and the cost to bring it in to all of the home owners within Wildhorse Spring Farms (\$65,857.46) total contract price is \$103,000.00.

I had reached out to Nathan at Whisper for a price on the cable plant for broadband only 2 years ago. He came up with an estimate cost of just over \$200,000.00 for the same cable run.

While I'd hoped the Wildwood would be receptive to Charter's proposal, Joe had said that the City could not legally participate because Charter would still maintain ownership of the cable run and not the city. As I've pointed out in earlier emails this defies logic and or common sense.

As a developer, I've personally paid Charter along with Ameren, Laclede Gas, MSD and American water to bring their services into my developments. In those agreements they've always maintain ownership of their respective infrastructure. Since I'm not in, or do I want to be in the Cable or, the Electric, Natural Gas, Sewer or, Water business it makes no sense for me to own, maintain, upgrade or, service the various utility infrastructures. If Wildwood would explore their position more closely, they would probably arrive at the same conclusion. Why would the city want to own technology they know little or virtually nothing about? Does it really want to address maintenance, service degradation and infrastructure upgrades much less fielding calls from unhappy customers?

As stated earlier, the cable run down Wild Horse Creek Road would allow everyone on either side of the road including you to take advantage of Charter's service offerings.

It seems that for some reason that Wildwood's Broadband initiative for our area is tied to Whisper's why is that?

Whisper is a small company with limited resources and as technology changes may not be in business 5 years what happens then? Whisper is selling Wildwood only one technology, Broadband and at an inflated price. On the other hand, Charter has a suite of service they can offer along with the technical expertise and financial viability that will assure a long lasting relationship with the city.

Thank you for following up. We met with a commercial provider regarding the Babler Park tower last September, following final cut-over and transition of our public safety and other agencies onto the new radio system. We had been discussing the technical and business terms with them regarding the tower use, but had not agreed on those arrangements. Subsequently, at its meeting of November 12, 2015, the Emergency Communications Commission voted to table all requests for commercial use of any of its towers for six months – we are currently awaiting the results of an audit and risk analysis conducted by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security regarding commercial use of the towers. Once the Commission reviews those results and recommendations, I will be able to update you further.

Over the course of 2015, and now starting in 2016, the Historic Preservation Commission has continued its efforts in completing a longstanding project of placing historic markers throughout portions of Wildwood that represent its original eleven (11) historic communities. In 2015, the markers for the Glencoe and Pond Communities were installed and received very favorable feedback from those parties that participated in their unveiling ceremony, as well as members of the larger community. These markers were selected for the first phase of installations, given the locations would be on City-owned properties, making it easier in that regard.

The next two (2) installations occurred just a couple of weeks ago and included the Monarch and Westland Acres Communities, both located on the north end of the City. The members of the Historic Preservation Commission and residents of the areas attended these installations. Participants at the unveiling of the marker at Westland Acres included Doris Frazier, a longtime resident, and some of her family members. Having the Frazier Family represented at the unveiling of this marker was particularly appropriate and made the day very special.


The status of the remaining seven (7) markers are as follows, along with the needed steps to complete their planned installations, between now and the 2016 Celebrate Wildwood Event at the end of August:

Community Name	Item Needed for Installation
Centaur	A new design is being considered by the Historic Preservation Commission for this marker's pole and was discussed at its April 7 <sup>th</sup> meeting.
Fox Creek	The edge of Fox Creek Road right-of-way (City-owned) has been defined and the wording for this marker is being finalized upon which it will be ordered for fabrication and installation shortly thereafter
Grover	The easement area has been defined on this private property and the Department will now provide this information to the private property owner – Imogene's Tea Room - for consideration of its establishment and use of an area upon the site for this marker.

Community Name	Item Needed for Installation
Hollow	The edge of State Route 100 right-of-way has been defined, along with a small easement area on the abutting private property, and the Department will now provide this information to the owner – Stovall's Grove - for consideration of its establishment and use upon an area of the site for this marker.
Kelpe	The marker is in fabrication and not ready for installation.
Melrose	A plan for the use area has been developed, where the marker is to be situated, which would include adding asphalt to the existing shoulder, thereby creating a pull-off area for viewing. This plan is also needed for permit purposes.
Orrville	The redesign is still underway, given concerns about safety and stormwater drainage along edge of roadway (Eatherton Road). Permit will be needed as well.
