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
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City Financially Sound

Everyone has felt the effects of the recession—individuals, businesses, and governments. Many state and local governments throughout the nation have experienced severe financial problems due to deficits and debt. With the City Council's recent adoption of the 2011 Municipal Budget, and in the face of the bad economic news residents see in the papers and on TV, City Officials believe it's important Wildwood residents know our City is still in very good overall financial condition.

Over the years, the City Council and City management have placed a very high priority on sound, conservative, financial management. The conservative approach the City maintained throughout the good times has enabled us to hold to a positive, steady course even in the midst of one of the worst recessions our nation has seen in over 60 years.

Below are some highlights of Wildwood's 2011 Municipal Budget and current financial position. Once residents review these facts, they should be able to feel confident the City is still in good shape and the future is bright in Wildwood.

- The 2011 Municipal Budget is BALANCED with all planned operating expenses for municipal services fully funded from revenues anticipated to be received during the year.
- The 2011 Municipal Budget does not draw on financial reserves to fund any operating expenses.
- There is a prudent cushion of revenues in excess of budgeted operating expenditures planned for 2011.
- The City retains a very comfortable amount of financial reserves.
- The City does not levy any municipal real estate taxes.

Mayor's Message



Hello and I hope everyone's 2011 has gotten off to a good start!

In this edition of the Gazette there are a number of articles worth reading and dates worth put-

ting on your Wildwood calendar. This edition contains updates on the numerous projects underway or planned for 2011, recreational programming, Council candidate biographies, and information about this year's budget. Several of the projects and dates noted for meetings may draw your interest. As I outline the State of the City, each of the items discussed are tied to the City's Five-Year Strategic Goals and Objectives.

The City's finances continue to be a top concern of myself, Council and staff. Fortunately, the City ended 2010 with a surplus of approximately \$437,000 in the City's General Fund. This is significant in the current economic environment and will continue to be a challenge this year. The budget for 2011 is essentially flat from 2010, with about \$95,000 less expected in revenue and about \$200,000 less in expenditures. The process to get a finalized budget was probably the most difficult associated with the City. Just as we have practiced since the incorporation of the City, every Elected Official and staff member will work to maintain our track record of yearly

budget surpluses while still providing the services and events every resident expects and enjoys. Maintaining a fiscally conservative approach to budgeting and expenditures will continue to be in the forefront of my mind throughout 2011.

As a reminder, the City receives revenues solely through sales and use taxes. The Capital Fund that provides for major infrastructure improvements is funded by a portion of sales tax, motor-fuel tax, road-and-bridge taxes, and supplemented with grant funds that are obtained. There is no Property Tax in the City of Wildwood and I will not support one as long as I am Mayor. The City has sufficient resources to provide services, meet the needs of residents, and continue adding to reserves.

The use of those resources is paramount as we continue with the detailed design work on a permanent City Hall for City operations. One of the objectives of this effort is to also reduce the cost of rent and maintenance on the facilities that the City currently uses. I am committed to having the project come in under budget in order to further enhance the City's annual savings. Accomplishing this will allow funds to be put toward other capital projects or simply saved to build the City's reserves. This new facility will for the first time bring all City operations under one roof, and will continue to maintain the City's commitment to promote and facilitate the development of Town Center.

Another key project for 2011 that will see a lot of attention and action is the development of the 66-acre Community Park. There will be

public input sessions to review survey results, a gathering of input, and discussion of alternatives. One session was held in January and another is scheduled for March. The input received at these sessions will be used to develop a plan for what type of facilities will eventually go into the park site. I wholeheartedly support the efforts of the residents who make up this committee. Residents taking the time to volunteer and contribute to the community are what makes Wildwood unique.

I'd also like to briefly touch on one of the scheduled activities the City has on tap this spring, which is the annual Egg Hunt. This event is a great deal of fun for everyone and has traditionally been held in Babler State Park. This year, however, the location of the Egg Hunt will move to the Plaza area of Town Center. 

- City employment over the past several years has remained constant at only 19 to 20 full-time employees, with 19 authorized in 2011.
- According to a survey of area municipalities conducted by the City's auditing firm, Wildwood's cost per capita for municipal services is considerably less than other municipalities.
- The City's outstanding debt is limited to \$2,165,000 Town-Center-Sewer-Extension Bonds, paid by assessments to benefitted properties; and \$3,000,000 Capital-Lease Financing for the New City Hall Project, to be paid from savings on the lease expenses from the former City Hall building.
- Wildwood currently has an Aa-1 bond rating from Moody's Investors Services, which is the second highest rating grade available.
- There are no City employee post-retirement benefit obligations since retirement-plan benefits are limited to accrued 401K savings-plan contributions.
- The City has consistently earned the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting, and the Distinguished Budget Award from the Government Finance Officers Association.

Fiscal responsibility doesn't end with the creation of the City budget. It requires constant fiscal vigilance on the part of City Officials and management throughout the year so that adjustments can be made if needed. Residents can be assured City officials and management are committed to prudent fiscal management, and will continue monitoring economic conditions and the City's budget throughout 2011.

Capital Improvements include planned expenditures for construction of roadways, bridge, capital maintenance, park development, recreation trail construction, land acquisition and other capital investments. The 2011 budget includes costs associated with the design and construction of the new City Hall and Police Facility, which represents over 50 percent of the total amount budgeted for Capital Improvements.

Your City Council Candidates

Wildwood is divided into eight Wards, with two Council Members elected to represent each Ward. The Council Members from each Ward serve staggered, two-year terms, which results in one new Council Member from each Ward being elected every April to represent their Ward. This year, in Wards One through Seven, voters at the April 5 election will vote for one Council Member from their Ward, but voters in Ward Eight will be asked to vote for two Council Members. This change is due to the appointment of an interim Council Member in Ward Eight, who according to the City's Charter could only serve as an appointee until the next municipal election.

Here are the responses by all of the April 2011 candidates to a request for biographical information. This information is provided to help voters make an informed decision when they go to the polls in April. The candidates are listed in the order they filed for office, and an asterisk next to a candidate's name denotes that candidate as an incumbent.

WARD FIVE

No one filed as a candidate for Ward Five. The Mayor with advice and consent of a majority of the members of the City Council will appoint a resident from Ward Five to serve as Council Member until April 2012 election.

WARD SIX



Ron James*

Mr. James is running unopposed for his second consecutive, full term as a Council Member in Ward

Six. He is currently a member of Wildwood's Administration/Public Works Committee and acts as the Council Liaison on the City's Historic Preservation Commission. Mr. James was a Ward Six Council Member from 1995 to 2004, and again from 2006 until present. Other service positions Mr. James has held with the City include Mayor Pro-Tempore from 2002 through 2004, 2005, and 2006 Wildwood Celebration Chair, and member of the Boundary Commission, Administration/Public Works Committee, Planning/Economic Development/Parks Committee, Old Pond School Steering Committee, and the 1996 Charter Commission. Other organizations with which Mr. James has been affiliated with include Missouri Buckskin Horse Association, Pond Athletic Association, Wildwood Historical Society, American Heart Association, American Red Cross. He also has been a Scout Master for 35 years with the Boy Scouts of America. Mr. James has been a member and held the position of president with both Pond School PTA and the Kiwanis Club. Mr. James is self-employed as the owner of Walnut Valley Farm and The Horse Handlers. He and his wife, Dorothy, have two children— Ron and Cynthia.

WARD SEVEN

Mr. McCulloch is currently employed as Manager of Corporate Security. He and his wife, Joyce, have three children— Patrick, Kevin, and Andrew.

WARD EIGHT

Voters in Ward Eight will be able to vote for two candidates, as Council Member Larry Goodson has been filling a vacancy that expires with the April 2011 election. Per the City Charter, the candidate with the most votes will serve a full two year term and the candidate receiving the next highest vote total will serve a one year term.

Voter Registration Deadline for April Election is March 9

On Tuesday, April 5, Wildwood residents will have the opportunity to contribute to the success of our community by voting in the annual Municipal Election. **To be able to vote in the April election, you must be registered to vote no later than March 9, 2011.**

In the April election, residents will choose one candidate from their Ward to represent them on the Wildwood City Council for the next two years. Residents in Ward Eight, however, will choose two Council Members. (see "City Council Candidates" article for explanation) Your community depends upon your informed and active participation in our governing process to help continue making Wildwood a desirable place to live, work, and play.

Registering to vote is easy and convenient. The following information is from the St. Louis County Board of Elections and explains the different ways and places where residents can register.

To register to vote in St. Louis County, you must:

- Be a U.S. citizen.
- Be at least 17 ½ years old and 18 years old by Election Day.
- Be a resident of St. Louis County.

There are several places and ways you can register. These include registering:

- At any St. Louis County library.
- At most city halls in St. Louis County.

- At most public school offices.
- At the St. Louis County Board of Election Commissioners office, located at 12 Sunnen Drive, Maplewood, MO 63143.
- At a Missouri driver's licensing office.
- At a designated state agency while obtaining services.
- By downloading a voter-registration form with mailing instructions from the St. Louis County Board of Elections Web site at www.stlouisco.com/elections.

The St. Louis County Election Board maintains over 600 registration sites. A more complete list of sites is available on the Election Board's Web site. For more information, or for the location of your nearest registration site, call (314) 615-1822.

Residents who have had a legal name change or change of address since the last time they voted should notify the Election Board either in writing or in person at any one of the voter registration sites by the fourth Wednesday before an election to

ensure they receive a postcard notification of their polling place. If voters have not notified the Election Board by the deadline, they will need to call the Election Board office to determine their new polling place.

Voting is a privilege and a crucial part of our democratic system of government. Make sure you exercise your right and privilege on Election Day.

Can't Get to Polls on Election Day? Use Absentee Voting!

Don't let a problem with getting to the polls on Election Day keep you from exercising your privilege to vote. The St. Louis County Board of Election provides voters the opportunity to cast an absentee ballot prior to the election when circumstances will prevent them from voting on Election Day. Only voters who will be prevented from going to the polls for one of the following reasons may vote by absentee ballot:

- They will be absent from St. Louis County on Election Day.
- They are/will be incapacitated or confined due to sickness or disability, including caring for a person who is incapacitated or confined due to sickness or disability.
- Because of religious beliefs or practices.
- Employment by the Election Board.
- Because of imprisonment, provided all other qualifications for voting are retained.
- Due to permanent disability. (notary not required but voter must be on a list with the Election Board)

Wildwood Receives Ninth Award for Financial Reporting Excellence

Wildwood officials and staff feel it's important the City's financial reporting is not only comprehensive, but also understandable for residents. City staff and officials work hard to achieve that goal. A good indication the City has been successful in this endeavor is that for the ninth year in a row the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) awarded Wildwood its highest recognition for governmental accounting and financial reporting.

GFOA awarded its Award of Financial Reporting Achievement to Wildwood's City Finance Officer, Dawn Kaiser, for the City's 2009 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). Wildwood's CAFR was judged by an impartial panel that determined the document met GFOA's high standards, demonstrated a constructive "spirit of full disclosure," clearly communicated the City's financial history, and motivated potential users to read the CAFR. The City's CAFR is prepared after the annual audit is completed each spring, and 2009 is the City's most recent CAFR. The 2010 CAFR won't be developed until later this year.

The GFOA is a nonprofit, professional association that serves approximately 17,500 government finance professionals in North America.

Bicycle Helmets for Kids... It's a Law That Saves Lives


Riding a bicycle, roller skating and skateboarding are fun activities we readily identify with childhood. Unfortunately, they are also some of the leading causes of childhood injuries. And when the injury is to the child's head, the results can be traumatic and even deadly. Without proper protection, even a fall of as little as two feet can result in a skull fracture or other traumatic brain injury.

Kids will inevitably take a tumble when engaging in these types of sports, but when worn correctly and consistently, helmets can significantly reduce the severity of the injuries children sustain. One case study conducted in 1989 suggested helmets can reduce the risk of head injury by as much as 85 percent and the risk of brain injury by as much as 88 percent.

To help protect our youngest citizens, Wildwood ordinance requires children under the age of 17 to wear a helmet when on a bicycle, scooter, roller skates, roller blades, or skateboard while they are in the City of Wildwood. (Wildwood Municipal Code, Section 340.420) In the case of a violation of this provision, the parent or guardian of the child can be issued an equipment violation notice by the Police Department, which may be dismissed once a helmet is purchased and verified.

Even though it is not required by law, adults

So, remember next time your children go out on their bike, skates, rollerblades, scooter, or skateboard, make sure they have their helmet and are wearing it properly. It's the law in Wildwood, and it could save your child's life.

Hikes/Runs/Bicycle Events:

Cabin Fever Hike

On Saturday, February 26, families and individuals can select their own distance of up to nine miles, and hike along the Al Foster Memorial Trail. Plus this year the Rock Hollow Trail will be open, so hikers can add a few miles onto their walk in one of the prettiest valleys in the region. This is a free event, but pre-registration is required and the event is limited to 200 participants. The event includes breakfast, warm drinks, and a giveaway.

GreenRock Trail Challenge

Saturday, June 4, outdoor enthusiasts can tackle a challenging, approximately seven-mile hike along the GreenRock Trail, between Rockwoods Reservation and Greensfelder County Park. This is a free event that is open to anyone capable of handling the trail's uneven, rocky and hilly terrain. Pre-registration for the hike is required, and lunch will be provided at the conclusion of the hike.

Wheels Over Wildwood

The 2011 Wheels Over Wildwood bicycle time trial event will be held Saturday, July 16, and is a flat and fast 20K time trial for riders of any ability.



Tour de Wildwood

This year's Tour de Wildwood will be held Sunday, August 28, and features a bicycle ride throughout the City for experienced cyclists, with four routes available. The courses range from 9 to 48 miles, with moderately hilly to very hilly terrain and long climbs on all routes. This is a free event, with registration on the day of the event.



Movie Nights

Route 66 5K Run/Walk

On Saturday, November 5, go at your own pace and compete in this annual 5K Run/Walk along Historic Route 66. All participants receive a long-sleeved t-shirt and refreshments. Awards will be given to top finishers in seven age categories.

1K Fun Run for Kids

On Saturday, November 5, children ages 12 and under can participate in their own 1K Run along Historic Route 66. The event is free and all finishers will receive a medal.


Concert Series

Programs

Early Childhood Recreation Program

Home Alone Safety Class

Babysitting 101 Class

The City hosts this class twice a year for youth to learn the fundamentals of babysitting. This great course covers everything from the business end of babysitting to safety and play tips.

Severe Weather Observation and Safety Training

Do you know what to do when severe weather strikes? Learn to recognize the problem signs of severe weather and know the safety precautions you should take by attending this training. The City will offer this training on February 16, April 19, and October 11.

Summer Camp

Scrapbooking

This monthly, open-crop program for adults is available to everyone—from beginners to experienced croppers. Fee includes lunch, snacks, and use of equipment.

Junior Trailblazer Program

New City Hall on Track for 2012 Opening

A lot has gone on lately to make Wildwood's new City Hall and Police facility a reality. In early November 2010, the City Council took final action to authorize the sale of \$3 million of capital lease financing notes, known as certificates of participation, to fund a portion of the cost to design and build the new facility. The certificates will be paid from money the City would have otherwise had to spend in lease costs for the City Hall and Police buildings.

The City closed on the financing notes later in November, just prior to tax-exempt interest rates spiking upward dramatically. The average interest rate on the tax exempt certificates for Wildwood's new City Hall is 3.35 percent over a 20-year amortization period. Edward Jones Company served as underwriter for the certificates sale, based on their competitive proposal.

At this time project architects who comprise the Wildwood Collaborative are continuing to prepare detailed plans and specifications for the new City Hall and Police facility. The new facility will be built on property already owned by the City, on Main Street and just west of the new Wildwood 10 movie theater.

The City plans to advertize for construction bids in late spring of this year. Actual work on the building is expected to begin by early summer once the City approves the construction contracts. At this time construction is expected to take approximately 18 months to complete, with occupancy of the new facility targeted for the fall of 2012.

The Mayor then, with the consent of the City Council, makes all of the appointments.

If Disaster Strikes, Do You Have a Plan?

Natural disasters are no stranger to Missourians. We started 2011 with tornadoes and straight-line winds skipping across the state, leaving devastating effects behind them. Whether the disaster is a storm, flood, or from man-made causes, it's important to know in advance what you need to do to best safeguard you and your family.

The first important step is to develop a plan for how to deal with disasters and then regularly review it. It's imperative you review the plan with all family members to make sure everyone, from the youngest to the oldest, understand it and what their role in it is.

What if a disaster strikes when you're away from home? Have your children been instructed by you to stay at their current location until you come to them unless that location is too dangerous; and if they have to leave, do they know where the next meeting point would be? If phones are down or cell towers are overloaded, it could be difficult to reach family members. But if you discuss these situations in advance and make a plan, everyone will know what is expected and you can get together with less chaos and confusion.

In the case of severe weather, make sure all family members know where in your home would be the safest place to take shelter. This is especially important for children who could possibly be home alone when severe weather strikes. Do they know to go to the basement, stay away from windows, and if a basement

is not available to go to an interior room, such as a bathroom or a closet? It's also important that you practice this plan with them prior to a weather emergency, and especially set a good example by following it in the event of an emergency.

Flooding is usually something that can be predicted in advance of its occurrence, and if you are warned flooding is likely to occur, leave the area. Flooding can occur so quickly that people who delay their departure often get caught in it, and subsequently put themselves and others who try to rescue them in danger. Rushing water is powerful and can be deadly. Never try to walk or drive through rushing or flowing water. It takes very little depth and not much flow to sweep people and cars downstream.

Unfortunately, we live in times where natural disasters are not the only ones we could face. Chemical spills, explosions, and terrorist attacks could also threaten our safety. It's difficult to prepare for something when you don't know what that something is, but a general plan for preparedness can serve you in multiple situ-

ations. This plan needs to be open to change as needed or as instructed by our government agencies. In general though, you should have a minimum of a two-week supply of canned food, a manual can opener, and bottled drinks. It's advisable to store these items in portable containers so they can easily be transported to a change of location if necessary. Other items for this emergency kit would include an emergency radio, first-aid kit, flashlight(s), candles, matches, and batteries. Duct tape, a five-gallon bucket with lid, plastic trash bags, and toiletries could be valuable in case your residence lost water or electric, or needed to be sealed up. The exact items will differ according to your family's needs, and could also include things like medications, baby formula, or games to keep children entertained and calm.

As you can see, if you don't already have a plan prepared in advance, it will be impossible to cover everything when disaster strikes. A good Web site for additional information is www.ready.gov. Just remember, be prepared and stay safe.



Vial of Life Program Could Save Your Life

When medical emergencies occur, providing complete and accurate information to first responders could make a life or death difference. This is especially true for senior citizens and people with ongoing medical conditions. The Vial of Life Program is a public charity that offers assistance to senior citizens or others with special medical needs by helping them keep a record of all critical medical information in a location easily accessible to emergency responders.

The program encourages placing important medical information inside a clear plastic bag on the front of the person's refrigerator or in a plastic vial on the inside of their refrigerator door. The information should include as much of the following information as possible:


1. A completed Vial of Life form. (You can choose the questions you want to answer and skip others)

County's Warning-Siren Upgrade Should Be Complete by August 2011

St. Louis County is the largest single-activated warning-siren system in the nation, but its current, aging system has survived well beyond its life expectancy. As the system aged, critical parts became more difficult and expensive to obtain. In November 2009, St. Louis County voters approved a sales tax to finance the replacement of the entire St. Louis County outdoor warning-siren system. Work on the new system has been ongoing and County officials expect the new system to be fully functional by August of 2011. The new system will provide better coverage with fewer sirens, and will save money in maintenance and repair costs.

Full implementation of the new system is especially good news to residents in the western half of Wildwood as much of that area wasn't covered with the old system. Over the last twenty years, increased development in once rural or agricultural areas of St. Louis County resulted in residential neighborhoods with little to no warning-siren coverage.

The technology of the new system also allows electronic monitoring of each siren from a remote location. This means troubled sirens can be quickly diagnosed and repaired with minimal or no interruption to the system's readiness. By replacing the existing siren system with the latest technology, the County will provide the entire county with important audible warning coverage and save taxpayers money at the same time.



2. A picture of the person whose information is included is helpful.
3. A Photostat of your most recent EKG. (Your doctor should be able to provide a copy)
4. A Living Will or equivalent if one exists.
5. Any Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) documentation that exists.
6. Any other documentation you feel could be important to emergency responders.

In addition to placing the information on or in the refrigerator door, a Vial of Life decal should


be placed on your front door, advising emergency personnel to check your refrigerator for your medical information. All local emergency responders are familiar with this program and are specifically trained to look for this information.

To help residents take advantage of this program, the City of Wildwood will offer residents free copies of the Vial of Life form and decals. Residents may pick up these items at Wildwood City Hall, Monday through Friday, between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Residents can also download and print a copy

of the form, or complete it online at the Vial of Life Program Web site at www.vialoflife.com. By filling out the form online the information is permanently stored electronically and can be updated as needed.

Placing a Vial of Life decal on your front door and making the information readily accessible to first responders will better equip them to help you or someone you love when an emergency arises. It's a simple thing to do that could save a life.

Extension Planned for Al Foster Memorial Trail

The Al Foster Memorial Trail, as it winds along the Meramec River Corridor, offers some of the most impressive vistas anywhere in the Midwest—from soaring limestone bluffs and scenic water views to mature woodlands filled with abundant plant and animal life. As users traverse this trail, they could easily forget they are within the St. Louis Metropolitan Area and imagine they are somewhere in a wilderness area in the Appalachian Mountains.

In 2011, the City of Wildwood and the Great Rivers Greenway District will undertake an extension of this beautiful, unique trail. The expansion will take the trail farther to the west and south on property owned by the State of Missouri and the Great Rivers Greenway District, adding an additional 2,700 linear feet. The extension will also provide access across Hamilton Creek, at its confluence with the Meramec River. This creek crossing will feature a major bridge span and be a focal point of the project.

Residents who have not yet visited the Al Foster Memorial Trail should make it a point to treat themselves soon to a trek along this natural gem located right here in their own backyard. They are certain to be impressed with the beautiful views and peaceful solitude the trail offers. But litter doesn't have to be a part of the wonderful Wildwood landscape. It can be controlled and everyone is responsible to ensure litter doesn't spoil the beauty of the City we all love.

Below are a few things all residents should do to control litter and keep it from becoming an unsightly issue in Wildwood:

- Keep a small litter bag in your car to hold trash, and then empty it at your home or workplace. And don't forget to put it back into your car or replace it with another litter bag, after it is emptied.
- Dispose of trash in appropriate receptacles, not out of the car window. If you make it a practice to empty the trash from your car into the trash receptacles at the gas station every time you fill your tank, you'll keep both your car and our roads cleaner.

Home Improvement Loans Available For Eligible Homeowners

For homeowners with fixed or limited incomes, home repairs can create a financial burden.

To help elderly and lower-income homeowners make necessary home repairs, the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Home Improvement Loan Program. This program provides one-time, no-interest, five-year forgivable loans of up to \$5,000 for owner-occupied, single-family homes.

The loan program is primarily limited to home improvement and repair costs associated with electrical, plumbing, roofing, heating and cooling, and masonry. To qualify for the loans homeowners must meet certain income and eligibility guidelines.

The City of Wildwood has allocated its 2011 CDBG funds on a citywide basis to

provide financial assistance to elderly and lower-income homeowners for necessary home repairs. The St. Louis County Office of Community Development will administer the program for Wildwood, and is now accepting applications for CDBG Home Improvement Loans from income-eligible Wildwood residents.

To apply for a CDBG Home Improvement Loan:

- Contact the St. Louis County Community Development Office by calling Rose Loehr at (314) 615-4025. Residents are required to mail income verification as directed.
- This program is only available to owner-occupied households. Applicants must be current on their real estate taxes.

St. Louis County Police Department Receives 4th Accreditation Recognition

The St. Louis County Police Department recently received reaccreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). This was the fourth reaccreditation the Department has received after its initial CALEA accreditation in 1998.

In addition to receiving reaccreditation, the St. Louis County Police Department was named a CALEA Flagship Agency for having continually demonstrated excellence in commitment to the CALEA accreditation process and a willingness to share with others its accreditation success. Less than 150 CALEA accredited law enforcement agencies worldwide have the Flagship Agency designation. Another significant award CALEA presented to the Department was its Tri-Arc award in recognition of the Department receiving accreditation in all three areas of the agency: the Police Department, the training academy and the bureau of communi-

cations. Less than 10 CALEA-accredited-law-enforcement agencies worldwide have received the Tri-Arc award.

The St. Louis County Police Department employs approximately 800 commissioned police officers and 200 civilian personnel and consists of the Chief of Police and four divisions. The employees within these divisions of the Department must abide by 463 CALEA "best practices" standards to achieve the reaccreditation.

The purpose of CALEA's accreditation programs is to improve the delivery of public safety services by maintaining a body of standards, developing public-safety practitioners, covering a wide range of up-to-date public-safety initiatives, establishing and administering an accreditation process, and recognizing professional excellence. CALEA was created in 1979 as a credentialing authority through the joint efforts of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLE), the National Sheriffs' Association (NSA), and the Police Executive Research Forum (PERF).
