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Mayor and Council at Groundbreaking Ceremony

New City Hall Construction Underway

A groundbreaking ceremony held on September 26, 2011, signaled the beginning of the project to construct the New Wildwood City Hall and Police Facility, located on Main Street in Town Center, just west of the Wildwood Theater. Actual construction got underway in late October, with an expected completion date sometime by late 2012 or early 2013. Once completed, the new facility will house the City's municipal offices along with public meeting rooms and quarters for the Wildwood Precinct of the St. Louis County Police Department.

Wildwood awarded K & S Associates, Inc. of Brentwood, Missouri the contract for this important construction project, based on the firm's low bid of \$5,986,800. The City anticipates total project costs will be well within the \$8 million limit authorized by voters at the April 2010 municipal election.

The Wildwood Collaborative architects group, which is composed of Powers Bowersox Associates, Dennis Tacchi & Associates, Architect John Guenther, and hellmuth + bicknese architects, led the project's design process and is supervising the construction.

Mayor's Message



Welcome to 2012! I hope that the year has gotten off to a great start for you!

In this edition of the Gazette there are a number of articles all worth reading and dates

worth putting on your Wildwood calendar. This edition contains updates on the numerous projects that are underway or planned for 2012, recreational programming, Council and Mayoral candidate biographies, and information about this year's budget. Several of the projects and dates noted for meetings may also draw your interest. As I outline the state of the City, each of the items discussed are tied back to the City's Five-Year Strategic Goals and Objectives.

In this current, ongoing economic environment, the City's finances continue to be a top concern for myself, the Council and City staff. At the end of 2011 the City finished with a surplus, which resulted in continued growth in the City's General Fund. The amount now held in the General Fund balance tops eight and a half million dollars. This is significantly more than suggested by the auditors that review the budget annually, and in many cases better than neighboring municipalities.

The City's 2012 budget is slightly more optimistic, which is primarily due to the anticipated increase in General Fund revenue from the

countywide one-cent sales tax that is distributed, based in part on population. The share coming to Wildwood is expected to increase, since the latest census indicates Wildwood's population increased between the years 2000 and 2010, while the rest of St. Louis County saw a general decrease in population. Residents can be assured, maintaining a fiscally conservative approach to budgeting and expenditures will continue to be in the forefront of my mind throughout 2012.

There's one last note I want to mention regarding the City's finances and revenue stream, since from time to time I'm asked about this subject. Wildwood receives sufficient sales tax revenue to provide services and meet the needs of residents, while at the same annually continuing to add to City reserves. This is done without a City Property Tax in the City of Wildwood, unlike many neighboring municipalities; and as long as I am Mayor I will not support implementing a City Property Tax.

The construction of the New City Hall is well underway, and with a little luck and good weather it may be completed by the end of 2012. Bringing all the City's operations under one roof will continue to maintain Wildwood's commitment to promote and facilitate the development of Town Center. We have been fortunate so far that the digging for the foundation has not encountered rock, which would require additional cost for blasting. It is my commitment to have the project come in under budget, and thereby further enhance the annual savings to the City. This would allow for funds to be put

against other capital projects or simply saved, adding to the City's reserves.

As always, this year City staff has planned a full calendar of activities that should appeal to just about everyone in some way, shape or form. By the time you are reading this edition of the Gazette, the City will have already held the Second Annual Frozen Feet Run, Wildwood Day at Hidden Valley Ski Resort, and the Cabin Fever Hike. These are just the start of the events planned for 2012. See the last page of the Gazette for a listing of these events and information. When you attend one of these events, be sure to say "Hi" and "Thanks" to those working the event, as they are most likely members of City staff and make it possible to put on all the events.

Finally, I would like to know when your next subdivision meeting or other organization meeting happens in the City. I would be happy to put a face to City government and discuss any of the issues or plans that are being considered. “Recycling Becomes Me” Campaign Changing More Than Attitudes

St. Louis County's new Recycling Becomes Me education campaign is changing County residents' attitude about recycling, and aims to significantly decrease the amount of waste County residents send to landfills. This attention-getting campaign demonstrates how easy it is for everyone to start recycling or increase the amount of items they recycle, and the dramatic effects just slight changes in recycling habits will have on the environment.

The campaign's Web site, www.RecyclingBecomesMe.com, includes information on how to start recycling, easy-to-understand pictorial lists of what residents can recycle through the County's curbside recycling program, and facts on the dramatic difference recycling more can make on the environment. Below are just a few of the recycling facts residents will find on the Web site.

- If each household in Saint Louis County recycles just one extra aluminum can, we can prevent 77 tons of CO2 waste from going into the atmosphere.
- If residents recycle just 5 percent more paper than in 2010, Saint Louis County could fill Busch Stadium more than 12 times with all the trees that would be saved.
- In 2010, in Saint Louis County we threw away enough trash to fill more than 2.39 million cubic yards of landfill space—equivalent to 265,829 dump trucks.
- In 2010, the amount of recyclables collected curbside in Saint Louis County equaled more than double the weight of the Gateway Arch.
- By recycling just 5 percent more than last year, Saint Louis County could fill the Edward Jones Dome three feet high 25 times with the amount of recyclables collected.

In addition to answering the questions of “Why recycle,” “How to recycle,” and “What's recyclable,” the Web site also has information on the campaign's contests and how residents can be sure their recycling efforts are noted.

Fourth Annual Electronics Recycling Event Offers Free Electronics Disposal

On Saturday, May 5, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., the City of Wildwood and St. Louis Community College-Wildwood will partner with MERS/Goodwill to offer Wildwood's Fourth Annual Electronic Recycling Event. That day, residents can drive to the St. Louis Community College-Wildwood campus at 2645 Generations Drive in Wildwood, where they will find a convenient, one-stop-drop-off station accepting a wide variety of electronics equipment for recycling.

And to make recycling electronics even easier, residents won't need to sort the various types of items into different boxes or even leave their car. It will all be taken care of for them. Also, in many cases MERS/Goodwill will be able to provide an immediate tax receipt for the equipment donated. Items accepted that day will include computers and all of their accessories, networking and telecommunication equipment, landline phones, cell phones, TVs, VCRs, A/V equipment, cable and satellite boxes, small appliances, clocks, and many other home electronics.

Last year residents filled over five and a half tractor trailers with more than 1,250 donations of recyclables. City Partnering with MoDOT on Design for Improvements to Route 109

The City is working closely with the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) on a joint project on Route 109 that will make improvements to the road from Route 100 to Clayton Road. The planned improvements will include a two-lane roundabout at the intersection of Route 109 and Pond-Grover Loop Road, two lanes in each direction on Route 109 divided by a center landscaped median, an extension of Pond-Grover Loop Road to the west, new Community Park site, and two pedestrian tunnels for extensions to the City's trail system. The project will be in the design stage throughout 2012, with construction scheduled to begin in the spring of 2013 and completed by the summer of 2014.

The project's primary goal is to address several safety issues along this segment of Route 109. Annual crash data collected by the St. Louis County Police Department have indicated this stretch of road is consistently one of the top three hazardous miles. The main safety improvement will be a reduction in left-turn movements, which has been one of the primary causes of crashes along this segment of Route 109. Traffic congestion will also be improved, especially as other segments of Route 109 are improved in a similar fashion in the future, particularly to the north near Clayton Road and Shepard Road. Other such phases of improvements will be scheduled by MoDOT and/or the City as funding becomes available.

The City and MoDOT shared Conceptual Plans of the project with area residents at a December 8, 2011, open house meeting. More than 150 residents and other interested parties attended the meeting and many of them provided written comments about the project. The project's Design Team are reviewing these comment to determine how they might be incorporated into the project plans where appropriate. Federal transportation funds of more than \$4.5 million were awarded to the City to make this project possible.



Community Park Concept Plan

Over the past year, the City has been working on the development of a Concept Plan for its Community Park property, located just to the west of the State Route 100 and State Route 109 intersection. The property is over 65 acres in size and offers a variety of environments and opportunities for the City. The major working effort of the City over this past year has been the solicitation of public input from residents and others on how they would like to see the park developed in the future, in terms of facilities, use areas, and amenities. This effort began with the establishment of a volunteer committee of residents to lead this public engagement process. Then, once public input information was collected, the job was to utilize it with a City consultant to develop a Plan for the future. This group of volunteers began meeting in October 2010 and completed their effort in June 2011.

The outcome of the public input, its assessment, and then applying the collected information to create a Plan resulted in the design components noted below. Highlights of this plan include the following:




1. A loop-road system around the perimeter of the property that links to the two proposed access points into and out of the park site. This loop road is designed for one-way traffic and will accommodate some on-street parking areas near major activity nodes in the center of the site.
2. A total of 187 parking spaces are provided on the property, with the majority located in the north and south parking areas. Handicap accessible spaces are planned as well for the park facility's activity areas.
3. A stormwater management plan utilizes the existing water feature in the southeast corner of the site, while adding other lakes, ponds, and impoundments to the system to provide for the control of runoff and aesthetics.
4. A minimum of 1.6 acres of the park property will be dedicated to the pond features.
5. A number of trail options are planned, which include different locations in the park, different surfaces, and varying distances, including the perimeter loop trail that is 1.25 miles long.
6. A combination of the Great Meadow and Great Lawn create slightly larger than a nine-acre area in the center of the site. These areas will form a combination of grass and native warm-season grass/wildflower meadows.
7. A total of 6 pavilions are planned on the property, with the largest being 5,000 square feet.
8. A large area of the park property at two separate locations are indicated as major woodland areas due to the extent and size of the White Oak and Sugar Maple species found there.
9. A total of six options are provided on the park property for the development of facilities and use areas, with the base option consisting of the roadway, trail, glade, and great meadow components to be completed first. The total cost of all options is approximately 10 million dollars.
10. The proposal for the use of the park property includes a maintenance facility that would also be used by the City for its salt-storage purposes.

As the City begins the design and engineering work for the development of Phase One of this facility, the City Council remains interested in hearing residents' opinions on this Plan and any suggestions residents may have regarding it. Southern Extension of Al Foster Memorial Trail Completed and Open for Use

The southern extension of the Al Foster Memorial Trail has been completed and is now open for use by all. The City Council and the Board of Directors of Great Rivers Greenway have planned to hold an official ceremony marking the opening of the new trail section later this spring.

The Great Rivers Greenway and the City of Wildwood worked throughout most of 2011 on this major project, which runs along the Meramec River in the Glencoe Area of Wildwood. This project is the extension of the Al Foster Memorial Trail from its current terminus in the Glencoe Area, to south and west on property formerly owned by the Marianist Retreat Center. This new section of the trail is approximately 2,700 feet long, 10 feet wide, constructed of chat, and follows the river for its entire length, which includes a large bridge span over Carr Creek. Along with the bridge span, the scenic beauty along this trail is unrivaled, highlighted by vertical rock cuts that soar above it, mature woodlands, and views of the river itself.

Second Phase of Manchester Road Streetscape Improvements Planned

In 2010, streetscape improvements along Manchester Road, between Schnucks and Taylor Road, were completed. These improvements included bike lanes, sidewalks, street lights and street trees. Similar improvements are now planned for the segment of Manchester Road between East Avenue and Route 109, with construction expected to start during the summer/fall of 2012. Part of this second phase of the project will include a sidewalk connection along the east side of Route 109, between Manchester Road and Rockwood Bank. The City was awarded \$999,000 in Federal transportation funds to help finance this project.



The remaining portion of Manchester Road will see similar improvements in the future, but will also include on-street parking. These later phases have not yet been funded, and may occur partially through the development of properties along this corridor.

Manchester Road Great Streets Master Plan

Many of us have driven on Manchester Road between the City of Wildwood and the City of Manchester and lamented about its condition—the number and speed of vehicles, the appearance of the developments along the road, and/or the roadway's design elements in terms of safety and function. Not many years ago, businesses thrived and constant growth was associated with this five-mile length of roadway, but as consumers' preferences have changed and commercial establishments went elsewhere, the situation along Manchester Road began to necessitate greater review and attention. If you've lived in this area for any length of time, you may have noticed the roadway was starting to show its age.

The effort to reinvigorate this roadway was begun by the East-West Gateway Council of Governments (the St. Louis Region's Metropolitan Planning Organization - MPO) and taken up by the five cities along the roadway in west St. Louis County—Wildwood, Ellisville, Ballwin, Winchester and Manchester. This effort began with a preliminary planning study of the five-mile corridor, which then led to a major planning initiative involving the five aforementioned cities, the State of Missouri, East-West Gateway Council of Governments, service providers, business leaders, and residents/users. The outcome of this effort was the creation of a major planning document—the Manchester Road Great Streets Master Plan.

A "Great Street" has certain characteristics that make it safe, functional, attractive, and meaningful in terms of its economic activity. These characteristics are universal and, unfortunately, after study it was revealed they don't necessarily occur on Manchester Road to the needed extent. They could exist in the future, however, through renewed planning efforts. These efforts will require the cooperation of many agencies, cities, service providers, and businesses; but if successful, they could start a new chapter on this venerable roadway.

Key components of the Manchester Road Great Streets Master Plan are as follows:

	Design Workshop Recommendation	Explanation
1.	Street Type	Develop a boulevard with medians and turn lanes to control turning movements and improve safety and flow
2.	Secondary Access	Create back streets for congestion relief on main roadway corridor (Manchester Road)
3.	Access Management	Develop cross-access easements, reduce existing curb cuts, and add shared access locations
4.	Traffic Light Placement and Synchronization	Manage speeds to 40 miles per hour and encourage improved traffic flows on the main roadway corridor
5.	Signage	Provide standardization of the signage to improve visibility and safety
6.	Wayfinding Signage	Design signs for each City's information, but standardized like roadway signage
7.	Landscaping	Incorporate landscaping into design of all improvements planned within the corridor, including street trees
8.	Parking	Reduce parking ratios, while encouraging shared facilities and a park-once philosophy
9.	Lighting	Manage illumination levels to reduce light trespass, nuisance glare, and loss of night sky, while improving visibility of lighted areas
10.	Land Use Plan	Adopt transect type with three recommended types, based upon a form-based code, but does not include parks and open space
11.	Utility Placements	Place utilities underground whenever practical or possible; otherwise relocate them to improve design parameters and aesthetics
12.	Noise Abatement	Improve designs to ensure new and existing residential land uses in corridor are protected to the greatest extent possible (through use of landscaped berms, building orientations, etc.)
13.	Open Space and Parks, including Art	Create greenways, trail connections, and coordinated areas of open space between communities and along/adjacent to the roadway corridor
14.	Stormwater Management	Utilize low-impact development techniques to comply with current Phase II Stormwater Regulations of the Clean Water Act, as administered by the Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District

2010 Census Triggers City Ward Redistricting

IT'S IN OUR HANDS

The results of the 2010 U.S. Census triggered the need for Wildwood to review the population of each of the City's eight Wards to determine whether population changes had occurred that would require redistricting Ward boundaries. According to Wildwood's City Charter, the population of each of

the City's Wards should be as approximately equal as practicable.

Based on detailed census data released in late summer of 2011, Wildwood's population at the time of the 2010 Census was 35,517, and four of the City's Wards had populations that were either significantly greater than or less than the numeric average of 4,440 per Ward. The Wards that fell outside of that average were Wards Three and Eight with populations greater than the average, and Wards Five and Seven with populations less than the average.

To comply with the City's Charter requirement for redistricting, in September 2011 the City Council appointed a Redistricting Committee. The Redistricting Committee, which is composed of a citizen representative from each City Ward, was charged with the task of studying the City's population distribution and proposing changes to Ward boundaries that may be necessary or advisable to more nearly equalize the Ward populations.

During the fall of 2011 the Redistricting Committee met on several occasions to consider this matter and evaluate potential Ward boundary changes. Their primary objective was to achieve population parity between Wards within plus or minus five percent of the numeric average, to the extent practicable. This meant parity could be achieved with minimum Ward populations of 4,218 and maximum Ward populations of 4,662. In addition to the number of residents in each Ward, other factors the Redistricting Committee considered included establishing rational, compact, contiguous Ward boundaries, retaining established subdivisions intact within Wards, potential for future population growth, preserving communities of interest, and the impact of redistricting alternatives on existing Ward Council Members.

Before concluding its analysis, the Redistricting Committee hosted a public meeting on January 18, 2012, to present to residents the Committee's findings and to accept comments from Wildwood residents on Ward redistricting alternatives. The Redistricting Committee is expected to present its final proposal for changes to Ward boundaries to the City Council by early February 2012. If accepted by the City Council, the proposed changes will become effective after the April 2012 municipal elections.

Parent's Guide to Firearm Safety for Children

There is no "best" age to begin discussing firearm safety issues with your child. Each parent is in the best position to determine when discussions should begin. Until safety is discussed, however, numerous issues related to firearms will remain a mystery to your child.

Children have a natural curiosity about guns. Don't fool yourself. Most children, given the opportunity, will play with a gun.

Kids will be kids, but a child and a firearm together can be a tragedy waiting to happen. Imagine how you would feel knowing that because of your carelessness a child was seriously injured or killed. This is a situation that can be avoided by following a few basic safety tips.

- Keep all firearms out of the reach of children.
- Firearms should be stored unloaded and kept under lock and key.
- Do not hide firearms under pillows or in bedside tables.
- Talk to your children about the dangers of firearms and advise them not to play with guns.
- Ask other parents in the neighborhood to help by also educating their children.
- While cleaning or handling a firearm, never leave it unattended.
- Never throw ammunition away in a trash container.
- Treat all firearms as though they were loaded.
- Further childproof your gun with a trigger guard or some other safety device.

To further assist the community with keeping our children safe when there are guns in the home, St. Louis County Police, Wildwood Precinct in association with Project Child Safe offers gunlocks. Project Child Safe is a nationwide program that helps ensure safe and responsible firearm ownership and storage. They have distributed 35 million gunlock safety kits and continue to do so. If your home has a firearm that is not secured by a lock, please contact the St. Louis County Police, Wildwood Precinct at (636) 458-9194 for further information on how to obtain a gunlock through Project Child Safe.

Your 2012 Mayoral and City Council Candidates

Elected positions residents will vote on in the April 3 election include Mayor and one City Council Member from each of the City's eight Wards. In Wards One and Five, however, there are two positions open due to a vacancy. In each of these two Wards, the candidate receiving the highest number of votes will serve for one year and the candidate with the second highest number of votes will serve for a year.

Wildwood's Mayor is elected at large, and all registered voters within the City limits will have an opportunity to cast their vote for any of the mayoral candidates. Wildwood's Mayor is elected to a four-year term, with duties that include appointing members to various City Committees, Boards and Commissions; signing contracts and legal documents on behalf of the City; and voting on legislation when the City Council vote is tied. The Mayor also has veto power on City legislation.

City Council candidates are elected only by residents of the Wards in which the candidates live and are elected to represent. Generally, City Council members from each of the City's eight Wards serve staggered, two-year terms, which results in one new Council member from each Ward being elected every April. As the legislative branch and governing body of the City, the City Council's major function is to adopt policy, which normally takes the form of ordinances, resolutions, and budget adoptions.

Below are the responses by all the April 2012 candidates to a request for biographical information. This information is provided to help voters make an informed decision when they go to the polls on April 3. The candidates are listed below in the order they filed for office, and an asterisk next to a candidate's name denotes that candidate is an incumbent.

Voter Registration and Absentee Balloting 2012

The annual Municipal Election is Tuesday, April 3, 2012. As Wildwood residents, you will have an opportunity to contribute to the success of our community – by voting! The City depends upon your informed and active participation to help continue making Wildwood a desirable place to live.

To be able to vote in the April 3, 2012 Municipal Election, you must be a registered voter. The following information is from the St. Louis County Board of Elections. The deadline to register is the fourth(4th) Wednesday prior to the election.

Registering to Vote

Who Is Eligible To Register To Vote?

To register to vote in Missouri, you must be:

- a. A U.S. citizen.
- b. A Missouri resident.
- c. At least 17-1/2 years of age (18 to vote).

Who Is NOT Eligible to Register And/Or Vote?

A person who has been adjudged to be incapacitated by a court of law is not entitled to register to vote. In addition, no person may vote:

- a. while confined under a sentence of imprisonment.
- b. While on probation/parole after conviction of a felony until finally discharged.
- c. After conviction of a felony or misdemeanor connected with the right of suffrage.

Where To Register To Vote. In order to vote in Missouri, you must be registered with the election authority in the county in which you reside. In the City of St. Louis, the election authority is the:

Other Registration Locations. In addition to the Election Board, a resident of the City of St. Louis may also register to vote at a:

- a. Department of Revenue, Division of Motor Vehicles, Office.
- b. Health and Social Services Office.
- c. Public library.
- d. School or other tax-supported public agency that has a Deputy Registrar on site.

An eligible resident may also complete a Voter Registration Application on line at the Secretary

of State's website, print, date and sign it, and mail it to the Election Board.

NOTE: Submitting a Voter Registration Application by mail or to an individual **other than** the Election Board does not insure timely voter registration. If you are unsure about the status of your voter registration, contact the Election Board.

Identification Required To Register To

Vote. When registering to vote in person, an applicant "shall identify himself or herself by presenting a copy of a birth certificate, a Native American tribal document, other proof of United States citizenship, a valid Missouri drivers license or other form of personal identification . . ." RSMO Section 115.135.2. Such "other form of personal identification" would include a current photo ID, utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that shows the applicant's name and address.

If a first-time registrant submits a Voter Registration Application by mail, the applicant should also provide a copy of a **current valid PHOTO identification.** RSMO Section 115.155.1. If the applicant fails to do so, he/she will be required to present additional identification when voting for the first time, such as a birth certification, a Native American tribal document, other proof of U.S. citizenship, a valid Missouri drivers license, or some other form of personal identification – e.g., a current or valid photo ID or a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that shows the applicant's name AND address.

When To Register To Vote. A person who is qualified to register to vote may do so at any time. In order to vote in this election, however, a person must be registered in the jurisdiction in which he/she resides by 5:00 P.M. (or the normal closing time of any public building in which voter registration occurs) on the fourth Wednesday prior to the election.

Confirmation of Registration. Within seven business days after receiving a Voter Registration Application, the Election Board will send the applicant a notice confirming his/her registration. If you do not receive such a confirmation notice, please contact the Election Board.



Absentee Voter Information

Persons Eligible to Vote an Absentee Ballot.

Any voter may vote an absentee ballot if he/she expects to be unable to go to his/her regular polling place on election day for any of the following reasons:

- Absence from the jurisdiction of the election authority in which the voter is registered to vote.
- Incapacity or confinement due to illness or physical disability (which includes a person who is primarily responsible for the physical care of someone who is incapacitated or confined due to illness or disability).
- Religious belief or practice.
- Employment as an election authority, as a member of an election authority, or by an election authority at a location other than the voter's regular polling place.
- Incarceration, provided all qualifications for voting are retained

How to Apply for an Absentee Ballot.

A voter may apply for an absentee ballot in person, by mail, by fax sent to 314-622-3378, or by downloading an application from the Board of Election website, www.stlelections.com

A guardian or a relative within the second degree of consanguinity or affinity may also request an absentee ballot for a voter in person at the Election Board. Such a relative includes a voter's spouse, parent, child, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister, mother-in-law, father-in-law, daughter-in-law or son-in-law.

The application must be in writing and state

the applicant's name, the address at which the voter is registered, the reason for voting an absentee ballot, and the address to which the ballot is to be mailed (if mailing is requested). In addition, if the election is a primary election, the application must also indicate which ballot (that of a political party or a non-partisan/issues only ballot, if available) the voter wishes to vote.

Absentee Voting Period.

Absentee voting begins on the sixth Tuesday prior to each election and ends at 5:00 P.M. the day before the election. The last day to request an absentee ballot by mail, by fax or by a guardian or relative is 5:00 P.M. on the Wednesday before the election. A voted absentee ballot may only be returned to the election authority in person by the voter or the voter's guardian or a relative within the second degree of consanguinity or affinity, or by mail or registered carrier and must be received in the election authority's office no later than 7:00 P.M. on election day.

Notary Requirement.

Unless a voter (a) is voting his/her absentee ballot at the office of the election authority, (b) has requested that his/her name be placed on a list of voters with permanent disabilities maintained by the election authority (see item #5 below), (c) is on active military duty (including spouses and dependents), or (d) is living outside the boundaries of the United States, the affidavit that appears on the return ballot envelope must be signed by the voter before a notary public or other officer authorized by law to administer oaths. This requirement also applies to a first-time voter who registered by mail.

Additional information applicable to military and overseas voters is available elsewhere on this website.

Voter ID Information

Personal identification is required in order to register to vote AND to vote at a particular election in the State of Missouri.

Identification Required to Register to Vote

RSMO Section 115.135.2 provides that a person applying to register to vote "shall identify himself or herself by presenting a copy of a birth certificate, a Native American tribal document, other proof of United States citizenship, a valid Missouri drivers license or other form of personal identification . . ." Such "other form of personal identification" would include a current photo ID, utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that shows the applicant's name and address.

Identification Required to Vote

RSMO Section 115.427.1 similarly requires a voter, before he or she may be issued a ballot, to present some form of personal identification. Acceptable forms of personal ID include:

1. Identification issued by the State of Missouri, an agency of the state, or a local election authority (such as a Voter ID Card).
2. Identification issued by the U.S. government or an agency of the U.S. government (such as a Social Security card).
3. Identification issued by an institution of higher education (including a college, university, vocational or technical school) located within the State of Missouri.
4. A current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that contains the name and address of the voter.
5. A driver's license or state identification card issued by another state.
6. Personal knowledge of the voter by both poll managers or supervisors upon completion of an affidavit signed by both managers/supervisors and the voter.

NOTE: A PHOTO ID IS NOT REQUIRED IN ORDER TO VOTE IN MISSOURI.

To help Wildwood residents become acquainted with the candidates they will see on the ballot on April 3, the City of Wildwood and the League of Women Voters are holding a Candidates' Forum from 7:00-9:00 p.m., on Thursday, March 22, at Wildwood City Hall. City Hall is located at 183 Plaza Drive in Wildwood. 
